Dear Mr. French:

Your letter dated August 1, 1975, requesting information regarding this State's reciprocity arrangements for certain licensed professions was forwarded to me for reply.

Title 56 of the Code of Laws of South Carolina, 1962, as amended, deals with Professions and Occupations, and I have listed certain citations from that Title which I trust will be of interest to you.
